



A LIVED FAITH

Recently I have been asked by a number of groups to speak about how our Christianity is to be lived out in public. Christianity finds itself at a turning point.

Traditionally in the West, Christianity was the dominant religious and cultural influence on society. Today, this has radically changed and Christianity finds itself shut out of the public square, cast adrift in a secular world.

How are Christians to be 'salt' and 'light', how can they maintain an effective witness to Christ and his Kingdom, when we struggle even to be heard? These questions will become, if they are not already, the dominant

missional opportunity the church has in contemporary culture. More than rational argument or lifestyle evangelism, public theology, theology for the common good, is an area God is inviting the church to occupy. What have we to add to how society thinks about euthanasia, the built environment, politics, the penal system, popular entertainment, and media are just some of the many issues our communities are wrestling with. But do we have anything meaningful to say? Are we allowed to say it? Does God want us to be politically active and socially engaged? I think he

Preaching through biblical books like Ruth and Esther recently has reminded me of this fact more than ever. My hope

and prayer is that we would be Christians deeply embedded within our cultural contexts and as equally committed to looking for ways in which Christianity can respond to the challenges of today with faith and integrity. One of the easiest ways we can do this, as but one example, is to look for what already exists in our communities and partner with them in transforming communities.

In my view, this is what applied theology is all about.
