
A LIBRARY HISTORY

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 Δ few weeks ago I got to preach at our chapel. This is always a pretty nerve wracking time when you stand up there to speak to a room full of biblcal and theological scholars (staff Sam Kilpatrick and students alike!)

As part of our ongoing BUMP theme I was drawn to a passage in Acts chapter 18 which explored, among other things, the place of Priscilla and Aquila in the life of Apollos.

Here was this learned man going around 'preaching' about Jesus but with at least one blindingly obvious flaw - he only knew of, and therefore only spoke of John's Baptism. I pondered how it would be possible for someone to go around preaching about Jesus whilst lacking so severly in an area of the gospel that seems so pertinent; baptism in the name of Jesus through the association of his life, death, and resurrection.

But that is what I found so facinating about this passage. We are told that Apollos, despite this flaw, is already seen as a brother in Christ and that Priscilla and Aquilla don't try to correct him, because the scriptures say that he already taught accurately. Instead we see them taking Apollos aside to help fill in the gaps for him, to help him become more accurate in his teaching.

I don't know about you but I was pretty blown away by this approach. I wondered if Paul had been present whether he may have insisted that Apollos be baptised properly, not just in John's baptism. But, we see no evidence for that here, nor in other passages where Paul speaks highly of Apollos.

So all of this got me wondering.

What is my approach to people that I think need some help to become more accurate in their knowledge and understanding of the gospel? Do I see it as rebuking them? Do I take the stance that they are wrong and need help? Do I correct them on their shortcomings?

Or is it possibe to be a part of improving someone's accuracy without taking a negative view of their understanding? It certainly appears to me that Pricilla and her husband set about to edify Apollos by ensuring he knew he was already a part of The Way. Then they set about helping him to better reflect the full accuracy of what that meant for him and for those that he felt called to serve. This seems to me to be an altogether positive bump experience.

It is also a challenge to me as I seek to help others, especially young people, fill in thier understanding of ministry, mission, and the gospel.
