## Tēnā koe,

Last Tuesday night I attended the screening of *Tātarakihi: The Children of Parihaka*. As three hundred sat inside Edge Kingsland awaiting the documentary, I noticed the quiver in the voice of the kuia hosting the film, overawed by the crowd. Sitting in those seats were many who identify as Pākehā and Christian, there to listen and learn from Māori about the experience of their tūpuna unlawfully captured during the invasion of Parihaka on November 5, 1881. We had come together as allies in the cause to bring the shadows of our shared history into the light.

It caused me to reflect on Carey's bi-cultural journey, which has broken new ground this year with the addition

of our Te Ao Māori and Te Reo Māori classes. Last month over fifty of us were welcomed onto Hairini Marae in Tauranga and attended the 150th commemorations of Te Weranga, the Bush Campaigns. As we reflected afterwards, it was obvious the weekend had profoundly impacted us all, opening our eyes to see the rich beauty of Maori tikanga. We are blessed by the leadership of Sandy Kerr and the knowledge imparted by Lorraine Taogaga, David Moko and the Te Kahu whanau among others. The gospel compels us to seek truth and pursue reconciliation; may Christ lead us further into new territory as a college and as the church of Aotearoa.
