Are you a budding Preacher or been preaching for a while but need a fresh shot in the arm?

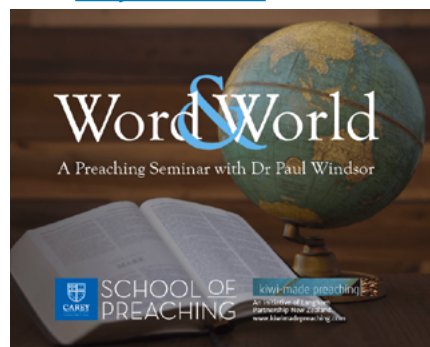
These preaching seminars will sharpen your ability to open up Scripture and culture, word and world.

## I made this...

Whilst holidaying down in the South Island earlier this year my husband and I went to Hokitika. Hokitika is known for its pounmu (Jade) and walking down the main street you see many shops selling the creations that carvers have made from this stone. On a side street there is a carving shop that sells ready-made items but also offers “carve your own.” It was into this store that we went in and signed up—captured by the idea that we could do something different. The process takes about four hours to make beginning with us coming up with a design (probably one of the stressful processes of the morning!!)—choosing from the pieces of jade available, tracing the design onto it, getting one of the carvers to cut it out and then using various machinery (unfamiliar to me but very familiar to my husband!!) to do all the steps to make it into the creation I walked out with. I remember the hours I spent making it . . . the stress of doing something new . . . the joy of seeing something take shape . . . the people I met, the questions around why I wanted to make a cross—and to not have it as a necklace—and the creation I now see. As Easter approaches I look at my cross and catch a glimpse of a creative God who died on the cross for me. God made that.
