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Coming to Our Senses

Theology needs to come to its senses. I first read this demand in Louise Lawrence's profound book *Sense and Stigma in the Gospels*. Her argument is that theology is so entangled with rationality that we read the biblical texts, especially the gospel texts, as a combat of ideas. And yet the biblical texts are not merely thinking something, they are doing something; the gospel is not merely pondered, it is embodied and performed as we make sense of the gospel.

The book of Revelation is, perhaps, the most sensational book of the Bible. In class, we are finding that it is a noisy, smelly, colourful, busy, and bustling book of which we are trying to make sense. It demands that we not only try to understand it but sense it too. In fact, sensing the book is understanding it. As a class, we've been stretching our collective resources to make sense of the book, and we have had to draw in a vast array of knowledges manage it—haka, songs, badly timed chants, art, music, standing on chairs, and sitting on floors. Revelation is a sensational book that demands we come to our senses about God and the world. It leaves us asking, how do we make sense of the gospel by our embodiment and performance of it?
