## Studying at Carey

Most students are studying towards a specific qualification and are enrolled in the associated programme (e.g. the Bachelor of Applied Theology programme). Students enrol into specific courses—most undergraduate courses are 15 credits—this means there are approximately 150 learning hours over the semester for each course (approximately 8-10 hours per week, per course).

The academic year is divided into two semesters, each semester is seventeen weeks long. Most courses are taught within one semester, although some courses are full-year (two-semesters). Some courses are taught weekly, whilst others have block sessions. For weekly taught courses, a semester will typically look like:

#### 6 weeks of classes

3 weeks of study/reading/research (and assessments)

6 weeks of classes

2 weeks of study/reading/research (and final assessments)

If you are a distance student, the classes are all recorded and then available via CareyOnline within 24-48 hours (in the Lecture Recordings tab of your course). We recommend you watch these in the week in which they are recorded so you can also participate in the online/ zoom discussions facilitated via CareyOnline. Your course teacher will provide detail around this during the semester.

## JOINING CLASSES / ZOOM AND CLASS RECORDINGS

Most Carey classes have a regular, on-campus weekly timetabled class. All students are welcome to join the on-campus class in person. If you are a regional student you can join the regular class live via Zoom link. This allows you to participate in the class session and discussions online from any device. If you are unable to attend a class live (e.g. you are working or sick), you can watch the class session recording—all classes are recorded and uploaded to CareyOnline within 48 hours of the class.

Some courses have a block intensives on-campus. We encourage all students to prioritise joining these block sessions in person (on campus) to maximise the learning experience and connect with your cohort. However, if you are unable to attend the block, you are also able to connect live via Zoom. All block sessions are also recorded and uploaded to CareyOnline. Please let you teacher know if you are unable to attend a block session.

## CAREYONLINE

CareyOnline (<u>careyonline.elearning.ac.nz</u>) is Carey's Learning Management System (LMS). Every course at Carey has a course site on CareyOnline. You will be emailed your login details for CareyOnline at the beginning of the semester.

You should check out the course site before your first class and then at least once a week. All course information will be posted to <u>CareyOnline</u>. Course lecture recordings will be posted to CareyOnline typically within 48 hours.

### POSTGRADUATE COURSES

Postgraduate courses are 30 credits and are typically full-year courses. They are taught in block mode and require approximately 300 hours of learning over the year. Details of how individual courses are offered are contained in the Course Outline on <u>CareyOnline</u> (Carey's Moodle online portal). Also refer to the section on <u>Postgraduate Study</u> later in this handbook, and refer to the Research Student Handbook.

### COURSE DETAILS

All key information about your course(s) can be found on <u>CareyOnline</u>. Each course has a Course Outline which gives detail about the content of the course, teaching schedule and assessment tasks. It will also give information about any special requirements for the course (such as noho marae attendance, or block course attendance). If you have specific questions on a course, please contact the teacher. Your teacher's contact details can be found on <u>CareyOnline</u>.

### TIMETABLE

The annual timetable gives the dates for key academic events, as well as information about course teaching times for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses. It can be located on <u>CareyOnline</u>.

### **BLOCK COURSES**

Some courses are taught in block mode. Block courses are compulsory for all students, and are typically held on campus at 473 Great South Road, Penrose, Auckland. We encourage all students to prioritise attendance in person at blocks sessions. If you are unable to attend in person, you can elect to join the block via Zoom—however please note that attendance is required at the blocks for the advertised duration. The dates for the block courses are published in the Carey Timetable. Block courses will also typically use Zoom and online participation to facilitate the class before and after the block sessions. Information on these Zoom sessions will be on the CareyOnline for that course.

#### ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Carey values the principles of academic integrity. These are outlined in detail in the <u>First Steps</u> course on CareyOnline and in <u>10 Essentials for Assignments</u>. Academic integrity is about acting with honesty, fairness, trust and responsibility in regard to the academic work you complete as part of your studies. Carey is committed to upholding high standards of academic integrity for both our students and staff. If you are unfamiliar with the concept of academic integrity, please refer to <u>First Steps</u> course on CareyOnline. All new students at Carey will be enrolled in First Steps and are required to complete this course prior to their first assessment being submitted.

### ASSESSMENTS

Most written assessments are submitted electronically via CareyOnline. Your course teachers will provide specific information on assessment requirements for your courses. Please also refer to the <u>10 Essentials for</u> <u>Assignments</u> guide on CareyOnline for more information about assessment requirements.

If you are having difficulty with your assessments, please talk to your course teacher. If you are unable to submit an assessment by the due date (for example, because of sickness or family bereavement) you can apply for an extension. The Application for Extension form can be found on CareyOnline under 'Forms for Students' and should be emailed to the <u>Academic Registrar</u>. An academic penalty will apply for any assessment submitted late without a prior-approved extension. For further information, please refer to the Academic Regulations on CareyOnline.

### WITHDRAWALS FROM A COURSE

If, for some reason, you are unable to continue with your studies, you can withdraw from the courses within the first four weeks of the course. If you withdraw within the first two weeks of semester, you can receive a refund (minus an administration fee) of your course fees. This course will then not appear on your academic record. After the second teaching week, you may still withdraw from the course, however you will not be eligible for any refund and the course will show as WDN on your academic record. After the fourth teaching week, you are not able to withdraw and the course with show with the result Did Not Complete (DNC). For more information. please refer to the 'Enrolment and Programme Regulations' section within the Academic Regulations on CareyOnline. The Application to Withdraw form should be emailed to the Academic Registrar.



## Postgraduate study

Postgraduate study means studying at Post-Graduate Diploma, Masters or Doctorate level. If you are a postgraduate student, you will be enrolled in one of these programmes. Andrew Picard is the Director of the Carey Graduate School which is responsible for the post graduate programmes.

Most postgraduate taught-courses are 30 credit full-year courses, and are typically taught in block mode. You can find more information about your courses on <u>CareyOnline</u>. If you are doing a Research Essay or Thesis, you will not have scheduled classes in the same was as a taught class, but you will be appointed a supervisor to oversee the research process. If you have any questions about the research process, please talk to your Carey supervisor in the first instance.

## RESEARCH STUDENTS

If you are enrolled in a research essay or thesis course, there are a series of important processes and dates that you need to be aware of. Please refer to the Research Student Handbook document located on <u>CareyOnline</u> for more information about the steps involved in the various stages of proposal/approval, ethics approval, research and reporting and assessment.

#### LIBRARY & STUDY SPACE

If you need space to focus on your research writing, the library has a dedicated postgraduate study space. This is located on the second level of the library building. The library staff are also able to assist you with locating research materials and helping with interloan requests. Postgraduate students have access to Laidlaw College physical resources.



## International students

If you are an international student beginning study at Carey, we welcome you both to Aotearoa New Zealand and to Carey. Community is an important part of Carey life, and we want you to feel welcome and as part of our Carey whānau (family). International students have specific academic requirements and pastoral support provision. Please ensure that you refer to the <u>International Student Prospectus</u> and <u>carey.ac.nz</u> for detailed information. #### **COURSE MATERIALS & ASSESSMENTS**

You should contact your teacher if you need help with: understanding the course material, advice with how to proceed with assessments, advice about course readings or where to get further material. Your course teacher will also be able to discuss any feedback given on your assessments.

#### LEARNING DEVELOPMENT

There are a range of self-help resources available on <u>CareyOnline</u> to help you in your studies. If you are unsure of how to access these materials please talk with one of the library team.

## LIBRARY GUIDE

This brochure covers borrowing procedures and loan periods, how to reserve an item, and information on how to use the library catalogue to search for resources and journal articles. It also lists the range of collections that are available.

#### PEER WRITING ASSISTANTS

Carey has a team of student peer writing assistants that are available to provide help with writing assignments. They won't tell you WHAT to write, but will be able to discuss your assessment structure and academic writing considerations. To book a session with the PWA team, talk to one of the library team.

#### FIRST STEPS

This is a <u>CareyOnline</u> course that outlines the key aspects of academic integrity and academic writing that students need to be familiar with when engaging with academic study. All new students are required to complete this course. You can find <u>First Steps</u> under MyCourses on <u>CareyOnline</u>.

### 10 ESSENTIALS

The <u>10 Essentials</u> guide covers all aspects of researching and writing an assignment. It has sections on writing style, referencing and accessing library resources. It has important information for you to be aware of before starting your first assessment.

#### ACADEMIC WRITING SUPPORT

There are a number of ways in which we can help you with academic writing. Talk to the library team to find out more about options for help with ESOL writing, assessment guidance and peer-writing support.

## **STUDENT ID CARDS**

When you start your studies at Carey, you will be issued with a photo identification card. You should carry this with you on campus at all times as they are also building access cards.

## STUDY & MEETING PLACES

The Library has study spaces that accommodate groups and individuals. Students can also use the Chapel for prayer or quiet reflection when it is not booked, along with Te Whare Oranga.

## PHOTOCOPIERS

Photocopiers are available to students and are operated via a photocopy card which students purchase, then add money to for photocopying as required. Photocopying can be done in either black and white or colour. See Fees Regulations and Schedule (in Academic Regulations p25) for more information regarding charges. A number of computers and laptops are also available to students for study related purposes—on campus.

## CAR PARKING

There is plenty of parking at Carey, with a large carpark to the rear of the buildings. Parking is free to students (white car park spaces only), but you will need to have a Carey ID sticker attached to the front windscreen of your car. These are available from reception, free of charge.

## WIFI ACCESS

There is free WIFI access for students and visitors to Carey. You can pick up a WIFI Access card at reception.

## LOCKERS

Carey has lockers available for students to use and they are located in the Library. Keys are available on the locker doors and we ask that students return the keys at the end of the year.

## SHOWERS

Showers are available for student use and they can be found in the same building as the Chapel—behind the toilets.

## SMOKING & ALCOHOL

Carey is a smoke-free, vape-free, and alcohol-free institution.

## MEDICAL

The college has a well-supplied first aid facility, as well as a sick-bay. An urgent medical centre close-by is:

## LUNCHES AT CAREY

Hospitality is an important element of community life at Carey. On Mondays and Tuesdays of lecture weeks, lunch is provided for students free of charge. On a regular basis at lunchtime we interview a variety of guest speakers. If you would like to bring guests please contact reception.

## FORMATION GROUPS

On Tuesday mornings we offer Formation Groups. These include our specialised training programme groups and a Formation Group that is open to all students who want, as part of their Carey experience, to journey more personally with others.

## COMMUNITY WORSHIP & WEDNESDAY PRAYERS

Every Tuesday we gather together as a Carey community to worship in the chapel. Students and Carey staff also come together in the chapel every Wednesday to share coffee and connect. All are welcome to join.

We encourage any distance students to participate in the range of community events we host. You are also most welcome to come by the campus and attend a class in person if you happen to be in Auckland when the class is scheduled.

## Local information

## PUBLIC TRANSPORT

The easiest way to travel on Auckland buses, trains and ferries is with a pre-paid AT HOP card. A student concession is available when you purchase an AT HOP card. Visit <u>at.govt.nz</u> for more information. The nearest train stations to Carey are the Penrose and Ellerslie train stations. Use the journey planner available at <u>at.govt.nz</u> to plan your journey.

Download the AT Mobile app or the Track My Bus app on your phone to have easy and quick access to train and bus journeys.

## ROAD SAFETY

Great South Road is a very busy arterial route for cars, vans and trucks using the four lanes at any one time. Students should take great care in crossing the road on foot and turning into the main entrance by vehicle. When driving, we encourage indicating early to allow plenty of time for cars behind to navigate. For more on road safety please refer to the website transport.govt.nz.

An alternative is to use the rear entrance onto Greenpark Road.

## EATING OUT

There are a range of affordable cafés and lunch bars along Great South Road within easy walking distance. Within 10 minutes walking distance north on Great South Road are a number of fast food outlets and cafés. A dairy is located along Rockfield Road (use the rear entrance for the quickest journey) approx. 10 minutes walk. On the corner of Oranga Avenue and Rawhiti Road (5 minutes drive) is a group of shops that includes a dairy, café and restaurant. There are a range of supermarkets within a 15 to 20 minute radius of Carey; Countdown Greenlane, PAK'nSAVE in Mt Wellington and Royal Oak. The closest shops are Ellerslie.





## Student wellbeing and safety



### STUDENT COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

If you have a complaint or grievance, we encourage you to first speak to the person involved. If this does not result in a satisfactory outcome, speak to the teacher or Academic Director. You may request or bring an advocate or support person with you.

If you wish to lodge a formal complaint in relation to the teaching or operation of the College, you should put that complaint in writing to the Carey Reception for the consideration of the Principal who may also consult the staff member concerned.

### STUDENT SUPPORT FUND


